POC

Point Of Contact (POC) for the DEA registration

Registrant

The entity (or person) that is registered with the DEA

The person that e-Signed the last DEA registration (for CSOS purposes)

CSOS

Controlled **S**ubstance
Ordering **S**ystem

The electronic alternative to paper DEA 222 forms for ordering controlled substances

Token

Security code sent by DEA to the email address listed on the registration. This code is required to access and make changes to the online registration



DEA's new Multi-factor Authentication

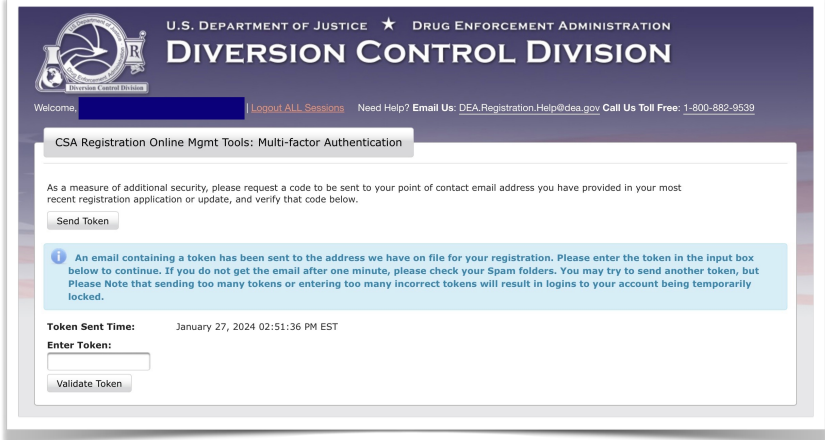
The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) recently implemented two-factor authentication to enhance security of DEA registrations. Any changes to registrations now require inputting a “**token**,” or security code sent to the email listed on the registration. This extra layer helps prevent unauthorized access and strengthens overall security measures within the DEA's systems.



FAWKS Call to Action!

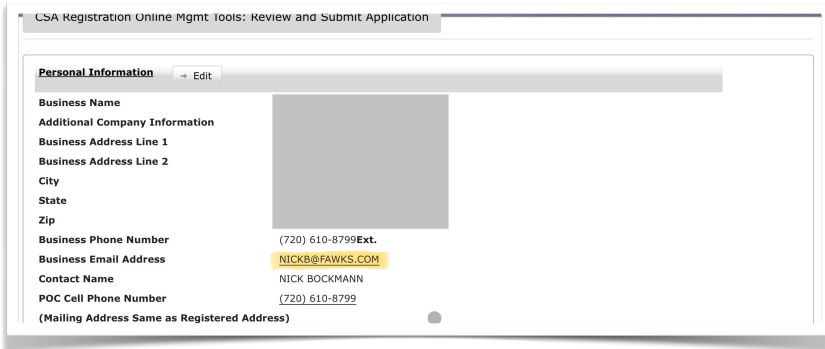
After speaking with a local DEA registration specialist and dealing with frustrations from facilities when a **POC** has left or is unknown, my call to action to contribute to the efficiency of the process & **minimize disruptions** in controlled substance ordering (i.e. DEA 222 forms and CSOS) is:

- **Keep the email address on the registration up to date**
- **Keep the email address accessible even after the individual leaves the facility**
- **Regularly verify and update contact information**



POC

POC is the contact person on the registration. The important thing to remember here is that the **“token”** to access the registration is sent to the address highlighted in the online registration below.



E-Signature

At the bottom of the online registration you will see an area for e-Signature. The person that types their name in here is the person that is allowed to use DEA 222 forms **AND** is considered the **Registrant** if utilizing **CSOS**.
